

## MY DIABETES EMERGENCY PLAN

Prepare a portable, insulated and waterproof diabetes emergency kit	Empty plastic bottles or sharps containers for syringes, needles and lancets
that contains the following items:	Source of carbohydrate to treat hypoglycemic reactions (for example, glucose tablets, 6 oz.
List of the following information:	juice boxes, glucose gel, regular soda, sugar, honey or hard candy)
Type of diabetes	
<ul> <li>All of your medical conditions, allergies and prior surgeries</li> </ul>	A 2-day supply of nonperishable food (for example, peanut butter or cheese crackers,
All medications (include pharmacy contact information, active prescription information	meal replacement shakes or bars, etc.)
and eligible refills)	At least a 3-day supply of bottled water
<ul> <li>Previous diabetes medications and reason for discontinuation</li> </ul>	Pen/pencil and notepad to record blood sugar,
<ul> <li>Contact information for all your health care professionals and for at least two emergency contacts</li> </ul>	other test results and any new signs/symptoms suggesting medical problems
Letter from your diabetes healthcare professionals with most recent diabetes medication regimen (especially if taking insulin), health insurance card, living will, healthcare power of attorney, etc.	First aid supplies such as bandages, cotton swabs, dressings and topical medications (antibiotic ointments or creams)
	Other recommendations:
Most recent laboratory results (especially A1C, kidney and liver tests)	Wear shoes and socks while awake and examine
	your feet often for cuts, sores, red spots,
If possible, a 30-day supply of all medications taken by mouth or injection for diabetes as well as all other medical conditions	swelling, blisters, calluses and infected toenails or any unusual condition
Include insulin and a severe hypoglycemia	Make sure that all vaccinations, including
